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Bank of America/IMLS American Heritage Preservation Program

Bank of America is partnering with the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) to provide grants up to \$3,000 to raise awareness and fund preservation of treasures held in small museums, libraries, and archives. The deadline for applications is September 15, 2008.

Grants will help to preserve specific items, including works of art, artifacts, and historical documents that are in need of conservation. Applicants will build on completed conservation assessments of their collections to ensure that the Bank of America/IMLS grants are used in accordance with best practices in the field and underscore the importance of assessment planning.

Examples of completed conservation assessments include those done by the Conservation Assessment Program, the National Endowment of the Humanities' Preservation Assistance Grants, and programs offered by some states.

Focus on Fundraising: Statewide Planning Grant

In January 2008, the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) awarded 19 Statewide Planning Grants to address the recommendations of the Heritage Health Index. Statewide Planning Grants are part of the

IMLS' Connecting to Collections: A Call to Action initiative and aim to foster partnerships among museum and library organizations in every state and territory. The second and final deadline for applications is October 16, 2008.

If your state has received an IMLS Statewide Planning Grant, make sure to contact the grant organizers to ask how your museum can help. Many states are conducting surveys of museums, historical societies, archives, and libraries and need your participation.

Spotlight on a CAPped Museum!

The Athens County Historical Society and Museum (ACHSM) in Athens, Ohio, is dedicated to the preservation and interpretation of the history and heritage of Athens County. The ACHSM participated in CAP in 2007 and selected Laurie Booth (conservator) and Lori Sipes (architect) to conduct their conservation assessments.

The ACHSM hired Heather Reed as Curator/Education Coordinator on July 1, 2008. Heather saw the CAP reports as confirmation of what the museum staff already suspected – one of their top priorities was to create a collections database and inventory and organize the museum's 40,000 objects. With only three full time and one part time paid staff members, this would be a large undertaking for the museum.

For help with this project, Executive Director Kelee Riesbeck established a partnership with Ohio University Undergraduate History Association (UHA) in 2007. This partnership and outreach to student volunteers aims to match history undergraduates in the association and other interested undergraduates with professionals in the museum and historical society fields. Since the start of these efforts, six student volunteers have been working at ACHSM as archive assistants, exhibit assistants, and local history researchers. In one year, the students have already made quite an impact: ACHSM's photo collection has been cataloged and the World War II artifact and music record collections have been re-organized with improved documentation.

Through this experience, the student volunteers gain insight on the behind-the-scenes work of museums. Riesbeck adds, "The hands-on experience we offer better prepares students for professional museum work and gives them a leg up in the competition for museum or history museum internships. The intelligent, diligent and creative UHA students volunteering at ACHSM moves the work of our museum forward by leaps and bounds. Everyone wins."

The Athens County Historical Society is a great example of how a CAPped museum can use community volunteers for help with collections management projects.

The Northeast Document Conservation Center (NEDCC) is proud to present *Preservation 101*, a free, comprehensive, self-paced online course on the preservation of paper collections and related formats.

The course is accessible free of charge at www.preservation101.org and is intended to benefit professionals who are responsible for preserving library and archival materials. Participants will learn how to put preservation basics to work in the context of small and moderately-sized collections. More specifically they will learn how to identify deteriorated materials, care for collections, and set priorities for preservation.

DO NOT allow anyone but officially designated staff to enter a storage area or use keys. DO keep the storage room doors closed at all times. DO NOT leave collection items or open storage units unattended.

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IMLS Announces a Third Round for the *Connecting to Collections* Bookshelf

Based on the enthusiastic response to the *Connecting to Collections* Bookshelf, the Institute of Museum and Library Services will offer a third round of competition to distribute an additional 1000 Bookshelves. Applications can be submitted to AASLH between January 5, 2009 and March 9, 2009.

The Bookshelf is a core set of books, DVDs, online resources, and an annotated bibliography that are essential for the care of collections and focus on collections typically found in art or history museums and in libraries' special collections, with an added selection of texts for zoos, aquaria, public gardens, and nature centers. It addresses such topics as the philosophy and ethics of collecting, collections management and planning, emergency preparedness, and culturally specific conservation issues.

Priority will be given to smaller institutions, but large museums and libraries with special collections are also eligible to apply. Federally operated institutions, for-profit institutions, and libraries that do not hold special collections are not eligible to receive the Bookshelf.
